

A Welcome from our Churchwardens

Welcome to our Parish profile. We hope you find it helpful and informative as you prayerfully consider whether God is calling you to St Luke's.

Over the last ten years, and despite the disruption of Covid (lockdown actually provided an opportunity for pro-active development), we have successfully continued building an active church community at St Luke's.

Our congregation and visitors describe us as welcoming, friendly, supportive and encouraging. We have a high level of participation in church groups and social events. Church members desire to go deeper with God and are hungry to engage with Bible based teaching, prayer and worship.

We are a Bible-based, Christ-centered, charismatic evangelical family church which enjoys a relaxed and informal style during our main services, as well as offering a more formal 8.45am service (see page 9). Our worship is led by our committed and gifted music team with a heart for Spirit-led worship, who allow us to experience a range of styles and settings.

The challenges of Covid resulted in us immediately going online with our services. This in turn has seen a growth in new people joining us. We have also seen growth in our midweek Life Groups since many now choose to meet on Zoom still. All of this has enriched our ministry and drawn in new worshippers.

Our mid-week Life Groups are core to our pastoral and equipping strengths, and feed into our high level of community volunteering.

We have radically enlarged our church building in recent years and we are still updating and improving our facilities so that we will have a comfortable, well equipped modern space that can be more beneficial to, and productive in, our local community.

We are blessed with strong lay involvement in all aspects of church ministry and outreach. Training, discipling and equipping our fellowship for service and leadership is both exciting and rewarding. We are looking to grow and develop our ministry into the parish. We are willing to experiment and innovate to create a church that continues to be more contemporary and relevant.

We are looking for a dynamic and caring vicar who can nurture and equip us, challenge and lead us to be disciples of Jesus and a light to the people in our Parish.



Who are we looking for?

A charismatic evangelical Anglican with a pastoral heart who:

- believes in the authority of the Bible as the written word of God, is able to interpret it with wisdom and humility and communicate it clearly and lovingly
- has a vibrant personal faith centred on the Bible and on personal and collective prayer
- has good pastoral skills and a servant heart
- has a passion for serving God and sharing the gospel in the community and beyond
- is open to the leading, ministry and the gifts of the Holy Spirit within worship and elsewhere
- is family friendly and keen to expand the ministry among young families, children and youth
- is well **motivated, dynamic**, and is able to enthuse, encourage and support others
- will encourage and support male and female lay leadership, ministry and participation in all aspects of church life, helping people to grow in their faith and exercise their gifts
- is **flexible and comfortable with a range of forms of worship** including the informality and freedom of our main Sunday service

Our Vision for the Future

In order to move forward as a church post-pandemic, we asked our church members prayerfully to give us their thoughts for the next phase of our church community. The key areas we identified which have fed into the review of our Mission Action Plan were:

- Growing our relationship with God through worship,
 Bible study and prayer, seeking to be led and
 renewed by the Holy Spirit, and developing spiritual
 gifts to serve the church and the community.
- Continuing to develop our lay ministry and to train, mentor and equip people for service and leadership.
 (There is currently a high level of involvement but we are aware that volunteering is at capacity so this will be a challenge).
- Children's and young people's work is extremely important and an area we will be focusing on developing, as well as reaching out and supporting young families.
- Continuing to be a welcoming church for newcomers where people are enabled to become part of the family and develop their gifts.
- Reviewing and developing social activities and celebrations to encourage a sense of belonging and unity.

- Reaching those who have not yet returned to church post lockdown.
- Getting to know our community better so that we can build relationships, identify new areas of service and effectively target specific needs. We hope to develop the use of our church building as a resource for the whole community.
- Recognising God as our Creator, we want to become intentional in looking after His world by working towards being more ECO-minded both at church and in our homes.



Who are we?

Our background

Whilst there has been a congregation meeting and worshipping in St Luke's Reigate since 1871, the current congregation is an amalgamation of 3 churches: the resident St Luke's congregation, the remnants from a church plant in 1990s from the larger St Mary's Reigate, and some from St Peter's, to which the church plant moved, and which joined St Luke's in 2001.

This is important, as the St Mary's church plant met initially for 4 years in the Reigate Priory school gym, with a leadership team and honorary curate, and therefore engendered in St Peter's and more recently St Luke's a sense of all-member ministry, rather than being a spectator congregation.

St Peter's has since been "de-consecrated" and sold off. It is now a privately owned playgroup. The funds from the sale were used to build the new annex to St Luke's.



Whilst the churchmanship at St Luke's has varied over the decades, it is now firmly charismatic evangelical and informal.





Our Parish

St Luke's parish is in the south of Reigate, south-east Surrey. Reigate is a historic town on the North Downs, with good road and rail links to London, Gatwick Airport and the nearby M25. The town centre has many good small shops, bars, restaurants, cafes and two supermarkets. In the centre of the town is a large park, Priory Park, consisting of grassland and woods, with a lake, imaginative playground, skate park, tennis courts, football pitches and a popular café.

The North Downs provide panoramic views as well as very good walking. There is plenty of sport locally with football, cricket, rugby, tennis, squash, golf, athletics and bowls clubs. There are nearby gyms and swimming pools, a cinema in Reigate, and theatre, cinema and larger shops in nearby Redhill.

The area has many good schools. St Bede's, an ecumenical church secondary school in Redhill is rated outstanding, as is the local secondary Reigate School, and Reigate College, the Sixth Form college. There are also several excellent primary schools, including two within the parish, Sandcross and Doversgreen, and

a selection of very good private schools. Within the parish there is also a special needs school and three nurseries.

The parish consists of about 3,000 households, is largely residential but opens into countryside to the west. It is divided into 3 areas, South Park, where the church is situated, Woodhatch, and Doversgreen (the site of St Peters). As well as the facilities of Reigate town centre, the parish has a parade of local shops. We work with 3 local Co-op stores by collecting unwanted food for those in need.

The parish borders both Priory Park and Earlswood Lakes, a popular local area for walks. In the centre of the parish is an open area with recently renovated BMX and skateboard park, and playground. The local YMCA runs a youth group, after school clubs and groups for children and youth with disabilities. We have links with Margaret Laurie House, a mental health rehabilitation home, situated a few doors away from the church.

Regular Sunday Services

8.45 - Holy Communion – a quieter service of Common Worship on the first and last Sundays of the month

10.30 – Morning Praise – a contemporary service with worship generally led by a band, with the organ used very occasionally. We begin the service together and after 15 minutes the children and young people go to their age specific groups. Once monthly the services is an "All Together" service, appropriate for all ages. On the third Sunday of the month we have Holy Communion. The service is live-streamed and is available to view on our Youtube channel. Prayer Ministry is available at the end of this service, as are refreshments.

Sunday @ 4 - an hour of activities for primary aged children and younger children, with adults. This is like Messy Church with play, craft, games, food, songs, stories and prayer every second Sunday.

Third Sunday 7pm — an informal time of worship, prayer, ministry and sharing on the third Sunday of each month. There is plenty of space and time to meet God and let Him minister to us.



Other Services

Midweek Service on Wednesday at 10.30am - in the St Peter's Room. An hour long, informal service where we sing and explore a Bible passage together, pray and share Holy Communion. Tea and coffee is served afterwards.

Our Christingle services are well attended by families from the wider area. We hold a joint Remembrance Sunday service with the local URC church. The road is closed for the service which is held in front of the War Memorial opposite St Luke's.

In 2021 we had 1 wedding, 1 church based funeral, 9 offsite funerals and 6 baptisms. By comparison, in 2018 we had 1 wedding, 0 church based funerals, 9 offsite funerals and 3 baptisms.

Regular Church Prayer Meetings

Sundays at 6.00pm – in person at a rota of homes.

Monday and Wednesday at 9.00am - started in March 2020 for the pandemic, these are held online.

Friday at 9.00am - in person in the Upper Room when possible, otherwise online.





Worship

Most of our worship is contemporary in style, led on acoustic guitar or keyboard and accompanied by singers and instruments, which can include clarinet, flute and cello with other instruments sometimes added to the mix. They are supported by a tech team comprising AV, sound and camera operators for the benefit of those in church and on our live stream. We also have an electric organ which is used for traditional hymns.

During lockdown we quickly acquired all the equipment, and learnt the new skills necessary, to allow us to record our own music urgently needed for our new on-line services.

As well as Sunday mornings, the team love worshipping in different settings. Our '3rd Sunday' evening service gives an opportunity for extended worship, introducing new songs and new worship styles in a relaxed and informal café style setting.

Members of the team link up with other local churches, and share informal and formal worship times. We also attend national worship events, and link in with New Wine worship leaders for input and advice.

We are keen to grow our team (currently about 20 including the tech team) and to encourage our youth and gifted congregation members to become more involved in leading and supporting worship.



Discipleship

We believe in growing in discipleship though a range of regular and occasional events:

Preaching and teaching - in services, Life Groups, nurture groups, prayer meetings and other events, we encourage personal growth through reading the Bible, prayer, worship, regular quiet times with God, and living out our Christian faith in serving others within the church and community.

Life Groups - meet fortnightly online (zoom) and / or in person to study the Bible, pray and discuss, with themes ranging from individual books of the Bible to Live Justly, Parenting for Faith and Pete Greig's Prayer course.

New Wine – the congregation is encouraged to attend New Wine each year (in person when possible), and it is a wonderful time of growth both as individuals and as a church family.

Dalesdown – the bi-annual church weekend away takes place near Horsham, with speaker-led sessions and breakout groups, as well as times of worship, prayer, fellowship and fun.

Global Leadership Summit - several members of the congregation regularly attend the GLS online or at a London church location.

The talks provide immediate and ongoing discussion to develop strategies for personal growth and church mission.

Bible readings - in Advent, Lent, and Easter Week, we have evenings focussed on relevant Bible passages which we read and discuss.

Diocesan training days - we have hosted and attended a wide range of such and similar events.



Evangelism

Alpha - we have run Alpha courses, followed by post-Alpha nurture and discipleship groups, which have led to full immersion baptisms and/or confirmation services.

Life Groups - some of the courses done by the Life Groups have focussed on evangelism, such as the Talking Jesus course, which in turn have led to discussions, sharing and increased boldness in sharing our faith with those who do not yet know Jesus.

Street Pastors, Winter Night Shelter, Sparkfish (see page 16) and Food Partnership – although not the primary focus of these activities, our community service has provided numerous opportunities to explain why we are doing what we are doing and to share our faith in the community.





Christmas and Easter displays and 24/7 prayer - we held events in the church pre-pandemic that allowed adults and children to walk through Jesus' life. Others focussed particularly on Christmas or Easter. These were advertised widely, with invitations distributed in the local schools.



Children and Youth

Sunday Club – during the Sunday morning services, there are children's groups running in the Annex and the Cabin. They learn about God in appropriate ways for their age with fun, exciting and challenging activities. They are currently using the Urban Saints resources. These groups are:

Bubbles – for children aged 2-6. A new room for them in the church is to built shortly.

Explore – for children aged 7-10 and occasionally they are involved in the morning service.

Thirst – young people aged 12 years upwards.

Thirst also meets for social events at various times and places throughout the year.

Little Fishes – pre pandemic, we ran a Friday morning preschool group, where activity included play, healthy snacks, songs and prayer.

Local Schools - good relationships have been developed with local schools, which have resulted in us performing "Open the Book" regularly, and clergy involvement in assemblies. Schools are invited into the church for various events and topic work.






Children and Youth (continued)

Youth Group on Sunday evening - X-Stream - as well as Urban Saints Energised, this group has also completed a Youth Alpha course, Youth Prayer Course and Storylines on Zoom during lockdown. They have attended Soul Survivor in the summer, and some Saturday Soul Survivor meetings at Watford, as well as local worship evenings. They hold various fun events, such as bowling, AirHop, Nandos, climbing, aqua park, ice skating, and the much-loved London Christmas lights trip.

Links with youth groups in local churches are being developed to hold joint praise and social events.



Pastoral Care

Pastoral Team - Alongside Alison Elson (our SSM) and Pearl Smith, our SPA (Southwark Pastoral Auxiliary - licensed pastoral worker), a small team meets on a monthly basis to focus on the current pastoral needs of our church family. We support those in need, especially the elderly, vulnerable and sick through visiting individuals in their homes, hospitals or care homes, making phone calls, praying and shopping or cooking as necessary. We have (pre-covid) had links to nearby Margaret Laurie House, an in-patient mental health rehabilitation facility.

Prayer Ministry – after every service, a pair of trained church members will offer prayer ministry in a quiet area of the church, and follow-up is provided if required.

Life Groups - meet fortnightly at the leaders' homes to study the Bible, share, grow and pray together.

Prayer Breakfasts – held either at the church or in a home, these are sometimes divided into Men's and Women's events, but always involve a time of sharing and extended prayer.

WhatsApp Group – the St Luke's WhatsApp Group is used for any urgent prayer needs (and also recycling unwanted household items!). We also use twitter and Facebook.

Bereavement Support Group – this has been a great encouragement to participants (although currently on hold).

Social events - as a church we love any excuse to meet socially, whether it is a welcome lunch for newcomers to the church, a quiz night, a BBQ, Fish and Chip supper, Christmas craft evening, walks, wine tasting, birthday/baptism celebration lunch or the occasional café style church.



Outreach into the Community

Open the Book – using Bible Society material, we perform Bible stories at the local primary school once a week, with additional performances there and other schools at Christmas and Easter.



Food Partnership – started in the pandemic, we collect food waste each day from 3 local Co-op stores and donate it to families in need and the local Community Fridge.

Renewed Hope - we support this local homeless charity financially and by providing overnight accommodation (pre-pandemic) and evening meals during the winter.



Wednesdays - after coffee, a home-

cooked lunch is served in the church twice a month; this alternates with a craft club for chat and companionship.

Street Pastors – seven members of our church are Street Pastors, going out on Friday nights in Reigate once monthly each; one church member is a trustee locally.



Fairtrade – we are a Fairtrade church.

Two members of the congregation are on the Reigate Fairtrade steering group, with responsibility for local schools and other churches.



Poppets Corner – a group of local childminders use the church on Thursday mornings for this group for younger children.

Sparkfish – a Christian organisation that works in our local schools; two church members work with them, and we support them financially, in prayer and hosting events such as the Christmas

story which they deliver to local school children.



Little Fishes – our own pre-school group on Friday mornings, held in the church, with toys, a snack and songs. This is not running currently, and we would love to restart it.

International Needs – we support this worldwide Christian mission and development agency which is focused on community development, human rights and Christian outreach.



Outreach into the Community (continued)

The Alternative – on 31 October we provide an alternative to Halloween, and fill the church with inflatables, games and

activities, and provide hot food and drinks. The evening is split into two sessions depending upon age: 10 and under, and 11 and older.



Veggie plot – within the church grounds is a vegetable garden, maintained by church members, and supplying local needs.



Pandemic permitting, we also run a
Hearing Aid Clinic at the church, and
the building is used to host NHS child
health checks, as well as Orbit Shed,
an inclusive theatre company for
youth, and Singergy, a local singing group.



We have always sought to share our facilities and hire out rooms in our church building for birthday parties and wedding/baptism receptions, training sessions and meetings, and fitness groups.

Global Mission – we are prayer partners and supporters of Paul and Alison Guinness, who are missionaries based in Burundi, and also our own church member Wendy, who undertakes short trips to north-east Africa with Flame and other mission organisations.



What we offer

Our Team – the vicar is the only full-time paid role at St Luke's, but we are blessed with an experienced and highly devoted team of volunteers. Of these, two are licenced assistant priests:



Alison Elson – an SSM who has been attached to St Luke's for the last two years



Pearl Smith - a SPA (Southwark Pastoral Auxiliary - licensed pastoral worker), who enables and supports the pastoral work within the parish.



Linz Baker – our worship leader, who has diocesan discipleship and worship training.



Maggi Jones – a retired vicar who previously had a parish in south-east London



Hamish Watson - heads up our tech team of AV, sound and camera operators.

At present we also have an ordinand in training, the second person in that role recently.

Judith O'Connell - our PCC secretary and part-time administrator who is paid for 10 hrs per month.

We have a very hard-working and committed congregation who are well used to carrying out all non-clergy roles, as well as preaching, leading services, leading worship, prayer ministry, technical matters, children and youth work, hospitality and outreach, as well as fabric and maintenance.



Our Congregation

At the end of 2021 we had 112 people in our worshipping community:

This age distribution matches that of our local community

At the 2021 annual general meeting we had 95 on the electoral roll 41 of whom live in the parish and 54 live outside the parish. This number has remained stable from 2019 the latest information on the dashboard.

In 2019 the usual Sunday attendance was 91 of these 70 were adults and 21 were children. There is no real increase in attendance at Easter. However, the numbers increase significantly at Christmas and rose to 450 in 2019. The Christingle services are extremely well attended which may partly be attributed to our good links to Sandcross school.

Our Congregation (continued)

Since the first 2020 lockdown we have been live streaming our services. Since reopening the church to services in September 2021 the average number of people joining online has been 62. This average has excluded all the Christmas services and both Anita's farewell service and Kelly's baptism as they would have inflated the average. Of this number we do not know if some people are re-watching a service but this would also be averaged out by the fact that more than one person in a household may be watching it online.

Taking figures from a couple of months pre and post lockdown gives an idea of the change in numbers and what services people choose to attend. The numbers for the midweek and evening services show no change. The 8.45 service has reduced in number. This may be due to people now choosing to come to the 10.30 service as this was the only service in lockdown which was live streamed. Also there has a been a couple of deaths in the older members of the congregation who constitute the main attendees at this service. The main drop in numbers has been in the

afternoon family service and children attending the main morning service.

We have been blessed that during the pandemic new people have joined the church and this has included families and older people.

Our buildings

Our church comprises a large, simply decorated Victorian church, built of local Reigate stone in 1871 (locally listed), with a modern annexe at the rear.

Within the original church building there is a chancel, a two-room vestry with toilet, a small chapel and a servery near the entrance. There is also a built-in tech desk with AV, sound and cameras for live-streaming and the of recording services.

The church has obtained a faculty to build a small creche in the rear corner of the church and to improve the heating within the main body of the church. Final quotes have been obtained and we are close to commissioning the works. We have started work on seeking a faculty in respect of new lighting within the main body of the church.

There is no graveyard at St Luke's but the church is surrounded on three sides by grass. Across a footpath, which runs beside the church, is a garden area with a vegetable plot and a cabin. The

cabin was used by the previous incumbent as a convenient office and meeting room. It is also used for children's groups.







Our buildings (continued)

The two storey annex was finished in 2015, and consists of a large downstairs meeting room with extensive storage, a fully fitted kitchen capable of catering for 150, four toilets, one of which includes a walk-in shower and baby changing facilities, and an upstairs meeting room (used primarily for youth and prayer) with small kitchen, accessible by lift.



The Vicarage

The vicarage is a modern four bedroom detached house in Beehive Way, a quiet cul-de-sac which is a 5 minute drive/15 minute walk from the church.

It was built in the 1970s and comprises a hall with toilet, a good sized galley kitchen, dining room with glazed doors leading into a large lounge and also leading into a conservatory. The house faces east-west and is light and welcoming.

The former double garage has been converted to provide a study/ office area with an external door and a toilet, separated from the living accommodation to provide a private working area for parish business and meetings. There is also a utility area with sink and plumbing for machines and a boiler room.

The stairs lead up to four good-sized bedrooms, all with fitted wardrobes, and a family bathroom. The master bedroom has an en-suite shower room.

The front of the house is paved with parking for 3-4 cars. To the rear of the house is a fenced garden with patio, lawn and flower beds.

Our Finance

St Luke's is blessed to have a very generous congregation, from whom approximately 95% of our giving is received by standing order. In addition, for larger projects, gift days have been very well supported, as have Harvest collections which have been to support International Needs (<u>ineeds.org.uk</u>)

All monies are held in a General Fund which is now solely held with CAF Bank.

We regularly review our contribution to the Parish Support Fund, the name for the Parish Share in Southwark (which is a voluntary amount decided upon each year by the PCC), and our annual increases have been in excess of the figure suggested by the diocese.

We are currently saving towards a new small (childrens) room at the rear of church, which is effectively fully funded, and replacement heating for the main church (the annexe had new heating when it was built), for which we believe we will have enough funds in place.


Annually the PCC tithes to a small number of charities based on our planned income.

On completion of the annex in 2016, the project was fully funded without finance. We are currently repaying an interest free loan from the diocese, to cover urgent stone work in 2018. We have repaid 4 years of a 6 year loan (currently at just over £8000) and this will be fully repaid by the end of 2023.

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APPENDIX 2

BISHOP'S STATEMENT



Statement in relation to the post, the needs of the diocese and the wider interests of the Church.

The Appointment

St Luke's is a thriving, community-based church which has grown in numbers and in confidence under the previous incumbent. Its informal style and family atmosphere have enabled many to feel at home who might have found a larger or more formal church difficult to engage with. The church's outward focus has encompassed both service and proclamation, and that combination needs to continue to be held together as it continues to serve its parish and to grow. Very encouragingly, new people have become part of the community through the online worship during lockdown, and have begun to come to the church since it re-opened for worship.

Although Reigate does not have any areas of significant deprivation, St Luke's parish does include areas of relative poverty, and has quite a different feel from other parts of the town. Although it was resourced by a plant from St Mary's some years ago, it now has its own distinct identity and mission. The new incumbent will need to listen to the people and to the needs of the community, and then have the confidence to enable the church to grow into whatever its next phase of mission will look like.

The Deanery

The parish is part of the Reigate Deanery. The former Area Dean (and parish priest of St Luke) wrote:

The Reigate Deanery is made up of 23 parishes and we embrace a diverse range of communities from quiet country villages to main town centres. We are learning that there is much to be gained from being a large Deanery as we are able to draw upon a wide range of expertise to support one another and to embrace new ways of working together. The aim of our Deanery is that we be not so much defined by our meetings, as by our actions. We aim to make both Chapter and Synod meetings gatherings which express a shared enthusiasm and energy for the missionary work we share. Support for projects such as Street Pastors and our Winter Night Shelter have shown us how we can start putting this into practice. We hold an annual workshop day to explore ways of empowering our laity. There are regular Quiet Days and Healing Services. In recent months the Deanery has been a focus for our response to the refugee crisis. You would be made most welcome amongst us.

The needs of the Diocese & the wider church

The Diocesan Vision sets out our shared vision for a future in which we will see:

- growing churches, new worshipping communities and new Christians
- deepening discipleship: engaged, prayerful and informed Christians
- growth in vocations to existing and new ministries

BISHOP'S STATEMENT (continued)



- generous giving and prayer supporting all we do
- justice and peace built up, and violence challenged, in our local and global community
- a shared commitment to the integrity of creation
- a church for all which reflects our diverse community in membership and leadership.

Across a varied diocese, that vision will be worked out in different ways in different places. In every setting, though, we are expecting each parish to reflect in some way all of the Five Marks of Mission; to be encouraging and developing the ministry of the whole people of God; and to be working collaboratively with fellow Anglicans, other Christians and their local communities in the service of the gospel.

Finance

Each parish across the Diocese is asked to contribute to the Parish Support Fund realistically and generously, and with an aspiration where possible to sustaining its own ministry costs. St Luke's pledge for 2021 was £35,000; the offer for 2022 is £36,500. Indicative costs for the parish are £81,900. In the light of the pandemic particularly it is recognised that finances are severely stretched everywhere, but generous contributions from all parishes are essential in order to support our mission and ministry. The increases in PSF contribution are very encouraging, especially as increases have continued through the period of the pandemic, and they will need to continue on that trajectory.

Collaborative Ministry

I am looking to appoint clergy in this Area who are able to articulate their vision for the mission of the church in the places to which they are called, and who have a vision for the church's growth. In whatever tradition or location, I look to hear from the clergy how they will work together with lay members of the church and with their neighbouring parishes and colleagues. I am looking for people with active and developing spiritual lives who are able to be an example of discipleship to the people of God. I take very seriously my own responsibilities as pastor to the clergy, and will always endeavour to make myself available to support them in their ministry.


St Luke's Church

Covid & the vacancy have provided us with both challenges & opportunities which have affected us as Church.

 - Explore the possibility of employing a person to take forward our ministry with C&YP Consideration to be given to cost & remit especially around church/community needs.

- Starting point: an audit of our current status covering the 5 areas.

- Involve the whole church congregation with regular updates & by making this a focus for services at least twice a year.

Demographic Overview

The population of the parish is 7,331 comprising some 2,950 households.

Whilst the parish is part urban and part rural as seen in the map in Appendix 1, the majority of people live within the built up area.

Reigate is known as a very prosperous town but our parish represents a more socially and economically diverse population.

The parish comprises three of the four quadrants formed by the A217 (running north/south and Prices Lane / Woodhatch Road which run east west. Of these it is the North-East Quadrant that lies outside the parish. The characteristics of the three quadrants are similar.

Of the 2,950 dwellings in the parish 86.9% are owner occupied, 3.6% are socially rented, 0.1% are shared ownership and 8.1% are other rented. One person households account for 25% of dwellings.

Amongst economically active males, 53% are employed fulltime and 4.9% part time, 4.8% are unemployed. Amongst females this is 32.6%, 24.2% and 2.8%.

People in the area have a range of qualifications including 27% who have a first degree or higher and 22% with no qualifications.

The area is predominately white 94.4%, black1%, Indian 0.8%, Pakistani 0.5%, Mixed 1.9%.

The largest ages groups are 25-44year olds 26.2% and 45-59-year-olds 20.1%.

Schools

Our parish includes two primary schools: Sandcross and Dovers Green with which we have excellent relationships. There is also a school for children with extra learning needs and three nurseries within the parish. Just outside the parish, in the north-east quadrant, is Reigate School (secondary).
