## IV. Outreach and Mission

1(a)	What are the regular mission and outreach activities of the parish?	We support Sokorabolo in Rorya Diocese, Mara with overseas donations. A water harvesting system costing £1850 was paid for by us and we continue to provide funds regularly. We recently hosted the Bishop for a day when he toured the Diocese We collect shoe boxes with gifts for Teams4U We support the Welcome Centre Food Bank and Advice Centre We join with the Methodist Church to provide Warm Welcome (with hot food) once a week We supervise the distributon of food from The Bread and Butter Thing. We make blankets from squares knitted in the Benefice and donate them to C.A.F.
(b)	How much is given annually?	Between £1500 and £2500. In addition we host the Christian Aid Big Breakfast which raised £600+ in 2023.

2(a)	Give details of the support for home missions and charities:	The Children's Society, Christians against Poverty, National Churches Trust, Welcome Centre and the British Legion, Church Army We support the local food bank by collecting food at Harvest and taking it to the Welcome centre. Direct monetary donations are also made by members of the congregation

We assist Community Cards in producing recycled cards which all our churches sell for the benefit of the Welcome Centre. The Local Ecumenical Project charity shop is a valuable asset to the community as is the LEP community worker. Café Church runs once a month to encourage fringe members to attend a less formal worship

They are trained in leading worship/intercessions and also reading lessons

#### Appendix 2: LEP Background

The aims of the LEP are to demonstrate a sense of unity and community between local Christians, and to provide a practical and united ministry to the local community

Newsome LEP was created almost 35 years ago and comprises two separate churches:

St Paul, Armitage Bridge (Anglican) \* Berry Brow Methodist Church \*\*

There are strong links with other churches in the area which are not formally part of the LEP:

Holy Trinity, South Crosland (Anglican) \* (NB: Holy Trinity closed 9 September 2024) Netherton Methodist Church\*\* Hall Bower Sunday School

The links are so beneficial that we have joined together and unofficially call ourselves the South Huddersfield Churches Together (SHCT)

Churches marked \* constituted the Emmanuel Benefice within the Leeds Diocese

We are fortunate to have the support of three retired members of the clergy who live within our parishes. They are Rev David Kent (SSM) who has Recognised and Regarded status within the Methodist Church, Canon Debby Plummer and Rev Angela Dick The population of our parish is around 15,317

Churches marked \*\* are part of the Huddersfield (Pennine) Methodist Circuit within the West Yorkshire Methodist District. The Probationary Minister is Rev Tim Francis

One of our successes as an LEP has been the opening of the 'Together' Charity shop where the funds are distributed to the LEP, the two churches and to the community through grants and other schemes. It also pays the salary of the Community Worker

Our Community Worker, is employed for 8 hours per week and works closely for the churches and the community

The activities of the LEP are overseen by an LEP Council that meets bi-monthly and is made up of three elected representatives from each church and the clergy
