The Benefice has a population that is predominantly white with almost all speaking English as a first language. Hampsthwaite with Felliscliffe and Killinghall: These populations are growing and are made up of a mix of families with children, older families and retired people. Birstwith: This population is made up of a large number of retired people and a few families with young children. Across the Benefice, housing is mainly privately owned comprising a mix of traditional houses, cottages/barns, bungalows and new builds, the majority of which are detached or semi-detached. (b)	Are there any special social problems (eg high unemployment)?	Unemployment is low across the Benefice but the lack of affordable starter homes in Birstwith and Hampsthwaite means the population is slightly older than average with associated problems of mobility and isolation. Due to a lack of frequent public transport, rural isolation of those living on the outskirts of the parish is an issue to consider.

However, we recognise the need to attract young families and younger people generally to attend church.

		Charitable works include: Birstwith Church supporting two children overseas through Compassion UK, giving £30 per month for each child. In 2023 donations were also made to Smile, Horticap and CMS.

		All three churches hold monthly coffee and cake events.
		Collections of food and other consumables are donated to the Harrogate Food Bank.
		The Benefice also has strong links with the Army Foundation College in Harrogate who send staff and Junior Soldiers to services in each church for Remembrance Sunday. The collections taken at these services are donated to the Royal British Legion.
