Monthly we will have fresh expressions of faith, including Forest Church, Messy Church and Eco Service. Numbers are from 10 – 40, but average for most services at 20.

Employment: across the parish there is a good mix of employment including agriculture, retail, manufacturing, light industry, and hospitality. There are many who are self-employed, professionals – some of whom commute worldwide, and a significant number of retired professionals. Ethnicity: Mainly White British. Age: A wide mix of ages with an increasing number of young families commuting professionals and a significant number of retired individuals. Housing Mix: A good mix of privately owned and rented housing. At least 80 properties are based on 3 residential parks situated in the villages. There are pockets of affordable housing within the parish. Significant areas of land within & bordering the parish have been designated for additional housing development which has started.

Currently across all 5 churches we use a form of Eucharist service using Common Worship and we normally use BCP if we have evensong services. In addition we have Family & Village services throughout the month.

We have a lot to celebrate within our 5 communities. Each one contributes to the diversity of the Parish, from bustling market town to lively & energetic villages. All 5 communities are proud of their heritage and genuinely care for their church; however all have a desire to increase growth in Christian worship throughout the Parish.

As a Parish we have a statement of inclusivity "Somewhere to belong" and at the beginning of 2024, all five churches individually and as the United Parish voted unanimously to join the Inclusive Church Network.

	Aldborough	Good. "The Church is in sound condition and commendable efforts are made to maintain a good standard of upkeep and those church members responsible should be commended for their dedication, energy and care" Quote from 2020 Quinquennial Report
	Boroughbridge	A quote from the Quinquennial report 2024, "St.James is clearly a well looked after and used church. However there are some fairly significant maintenance that needs to be carried out"
	Dunsforth	The Church is very well maintained thanks to a dedicated team including the Churchwardens & other members of the congregation. There
		have been no significant developments in the immediate area of the Church since the last report. Given the siting of the Church any significant development is unlikely.
	Minskip	This small church is well maintained and is broadly in very good condition. Regular maintenance is ongoing to ensure items like the rainwater goods are redecorated and the slipped slates on the south side are reinstated. Works to tackle over this quinquennium are the floor at the east end of the nave where the supporting joists appear to have failed, and there is a little bit of rot to some of the timbers. In addition to this, now that roofing work has been carried out and the walls are drying out nicely, works around the door to the north side need to be carried out. The area needs to be redecorated in a breathable material with lime plaster.
	Roecliffe	Very good – Maintained by the Church's Conservation Trust to a high standard
(b)	Please give details of major maintenance needed following the last quinquennial	Quote from the St James, Quinquennial states "A definite item that needs addressing is the junction between the north aisle and the nave. There is a significant opening here between the north aisle roof and the nave. The roof is open to the elements at the very westernmost end." The church council is in the process of identifying a project manager to oversee this and other repairs required.

1. List areas of Church life which you consider in need of development.

All 5 churches consider that there is a significant need to encourage and increase attendance. We need to explore and find ways to attract more families to our church. As young families have grown up, they tend to drift away due to the activities connected to school life (sports clubs etc), and it seems increasingly difficult to attract new young families.

In addition, many would like to make the church buildings more available on a regular basis looking to offer more up to date facilities.

The Aldborough Church Council have already started discussions about developing a vision to secure the future for St Andrews by providing more flexibility as a venue.

St.Mary's, Dunsforth are progressing the "Welcome Project "which is a plan to install an accessible toilet, kitchen and remove half of the pews to make a more useable community space making the Church more available to the community

It is hoped that the new incumbent will contribute and be actively involved with this exciting and challenging project.

Some would like to see more visible support in community projects.

Build on the strong ties with the Methodist Church and look at the development of an overseas church link.
