Foreword from the Wardens



We are a single congregation Anglican/Methodist Local Ecumenical Partnership firmly established in the Woosehill community.

Relationships. In the early 2010s, to promote the building of better relationships the church adopted a policy for supporting charities for a minimum of three years. These relationships have developed into partnerships.



Church calendar. Thinking mission around the Church calendar has led to events such as Maundy Thursday shoe cleaning, Good Friday Messy Easter, Christingles in local schools, Remembrance churchyard trails, Christmas craft bags at the Winter Carnival, Singing carols at care homes and in the Market Place, to name a few!

How our Parish has learnt and developed

Partnerships. Parishioners now volunteer regularly for Soulscape and Home-Start, likewise Home-Start and Soulscape have promoted and assisted in church events.



Outreach. Existing projects include Tadpoles for carers and under 5s, Thursday Social Groups, monthly Sip & Share, weekly Coffee and Chat. St Paul's choir is very much part of our mission, drawing children and their families into church.

Partnership in Missional Church (PMC).

Participating in PMC, from 2016, developed this relationship-based approach to mission further. Increasing awareness of the possibilities for missional work and the importance of listening.

Action. Plans had been drawn up to deliver a major community event in 2020, incorporating relationship-building, co-planning and delivery, but just as we were awarded the funding grant Covid struck. The time and resources were successfully used instead to arrange a visit from ordinands from Westcott House in 2023 to help with various community events for Holy Week.

Caring. The Pandemic taught us that noticing people and recognising their needs and who they are, is Christ-like and vital. We forged stronger links with GP surgeries, care homes and schools, through goody bags, snack boxes for staff, recorded messages, pastoral care and volunteering. Making sure people feel appreciated, cared for and loved has enabled us to continue these relationships.



Parish Feedback

Where we are now, and where we want to be

At feedback sessions held in all three churches everyone submitted their thoughts and discussed the state of the church now and our aspirations for the future.

Welcome, friendliness and inclusiveness are significant positive features of the churches we love, but other feedback also identified a number of key areas, common across all three churches, that we need to address. These include the need for more effective outreach and evangelism of younger age groups, with a particular desire to engage more with children and youth work. A very strong message emerged that renewed focus on sharing Christ's message of love and compassion with our local communities is needed. This in turn indicated a clear need to revive the enthusiasm built by our three year Partnership in Missional Church (PMC) experience.

Appendix 3 – Feedback Details

During the sessions everyone was asked for three words that described the church to them. A number of patterns emerged, as represented in the word cloud below which offers a snapshot of where the Parish finds itself at the moment, whilst the other feedback given in the detailed analysis reflects the feelings for the future.

Parish Community

Three Churches, One Parish

Our services offer choice and a warm welcome to everyone

All three churches hold a regular Sunday Service, with St Paul's offering a traditional Sung Eucharist including priests in vestments, choir, organ, servers, bells and smells. Hymns are usually from the Revised English Hymnal. On most Sundays the choir will also sing an Anthem. The Service is live streamed via YouTube. Apart from the regular 9:30 service, St Paul's also provides an 8:00 BCP Mass on two Sundays in the month, and Choral Evensong with sermon once a month at 6:15pm. The church remains open every day for private prayer.

Appendix 4 – St Paul's Choir

Woosehill provides a mix of Anglican and Methodist worship, all instantly recognised as 'The Woosehill Service'. Sunday services are held at 10:00am. Each month there are usually two communion services, one Anglican and the other Methodist, and 2 other Methodist led services. When there is a fifth Sunday in the month there is normally a Café Church. Currently music is provided either with recordings or the services of a guest pianist, but the congregation are hoping for a new music group to be formed to accompany the singing

St Nick's Sunday service, held in the Emmbrook Village Hall at 11:00am, is usually a sung Mass with a less formal Catholic style than at St Paul's. The music for the hymns is either played on an electronic organ, piano or recorded. We are exploring holding an alternative service, such as Café Church or Taizé. On special occasions, such as Mothering Sunday, the congregation from St Nick's join St Paul's. Every Wednesday morning there is worship and prayer in a home in Emmbrook; on the second Wednesday of the month this is a Mass.

Appendix 5 - Services in the Parish

St Paul's is proud to be a contributing member of Inclusive Church

Children and Young People



Soulscape is one of the designated charities in the Parish, and as well as providing financial help, parishioners volunteer in local schools with them.



St Paul's Church has run a Messy Church style event on Good Friday for the last few years, which has been well received by parishioners and other locals.



The Choir and the serving team welcome children and young people enthusiastically and are an important element of our outreach and mission.



Tadpoles provides coffee and play for under 5s and their carers every Wednesday in term time, offering a gentle Christian approach.

Of the 12 schools in the Parish, we have an ongoing relationship with 8. The two church schools have parishioners among their governors. The clergy regularly lead assemblies in many of the schools, and some hold services and concerts in the churches.



Sunday schools (called J-Club at St Paul's Church) cater for younger children during Sunday services in term time. At St Nicholas it is run less often. Woosehill no longer run their Sunday School, but resources are available for children to use during the service



Other activities that have been successful in the past and we would like to revisit:

- 5678 was started during Covid as a weekly online group for children in years 5, 6,
 7 and 8. A second in-person meeting was briefly added.
- Messy Church has been run very successfully.
- Open the Book has been run in some schools to introduce the children to Bible stories.
- Footsteps, the youth group for young people in the Parish

Children's Advocates represent children's and young people's needs at Council meetings. We are conscious that we need to understand the aspirations and desires of our children and young people better and work with them to provide better provision and involvement opportunities.

You will be working with us to look at ways to coordinate this work across the Parish to put children, young people and families more firmly at the centre of our mission and ministry.

The Parish is very active with many groups catering for outreach, prayer, bible study, socialising, children and young people. These include J-Club and Tadpoles for young children, Mother's Union, The Meditation Group.

Our pastoral group supports the clergy with the regular visits and home communions to a number of individuals, the regulars, those temporarily house-bound, and care homes. The Parish is also well resourced with a number of different teams such as the bellringers, the serving team, sidespeople (always welcoming!), and Social Committee. Woosehill run a very successful prayer chain.

Soulscape



A Parish team works with Soulscape to run The Lounge at The Holt School to provide a weekly lunchtime session for year 7. The churches also support a Soulscape team at The Lounge in The Emmbrook School.

The Parish helps with the initiative to take groups of youngsters to visit local churches and to hear about what they do.





This is an initiative to ease the transition from primary to secondary schools. Parishioners help in The Holt and The Emmbrook Schools.



Local Community

Involvement in the local community

Following our participation in Partnership for Missional Church (PMC) the Parish began looking at local communities around us and assessing their needs and our response. This led to a significant increase in involvement that proved beneficial when we were able to support them during Covid.

Local Schools

There are good links with 8 out of the 12 schools in the Parish with regular assemblies in many, and services in church for some. The two church schools, St Paul's CofE Junior School and St Cecilia CofE Primary School, have Parish members as governors, and both enjoy a close relationship with the Church. As Rector you will be expected to also become a governor of these schools. Many of the other schools have assemblies taken on a regular basis. Two of the Secondary Schools have close links with the churches and Soulscape runs various activities in them supported by the Parish.

School Details

Care Homes

The clergy and leadership teams of the Parish regularly hold services in 4 Care or Nursing homes within the Parish. Some of the homes also screen the live-streamed service on Sundays for their residents. We also have Parishioners visiting these and other homes locally.

Care Home Details

Wokingham Foodbank

Despite the apparent prosperity in Wokingham there is, unfortunately, a pressing need for the Foodbank to provide food for a large number of people in the local area. As a Parish we collect food regularly and have an annual donation service to support the Foodbank; Parishioners also volunteer there.

St Paul's CE Junior school has very close ties to the church. The Rector has been a Governor and was an important contributor to the recent successful Ofsted inspection.

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Wider Community

Our Twin Parish in Växjö, Sweden

The Diocese has developed a relationship with Växjö in Sweden and the Cathedral of St Sigfrid (whose icon is displayed in St Paul's chancel). St Paul's Parish has established its own twinning with Mariakyrkan (St Mary's Church) in the Växjö diocese. We keep in regular contact with them and there have been exchange visits. During Covid we also exchanged videos and prayers to provide mutual support.

Churches Together in Wokingham

St Paul's Parish is an active member of Churches Together in Wokingham (CTW) which maintains a visible Christian presence in the life of the Wokingham community. CTW also acts as a very effective communication hub for all of the Christian groups in the area. CTW organised the hustings for the recent general election.

Sonning Deanery

St Paul's Parish plays a very active part in the Deanery, currently providing both the Lay-Chair and the Treasurer. Sonning Deanery is currently going through a time of transition, with half of incumbents across the 13 benefices having been appointed in the last two years.

Local Councils

St Paul's works closely with the town and borough councils. Civic services are shared between St Paul's Church and All Saints. Members of St Paul's clergy have, in some years, been Mayor's chaplains. The previous incumbent was on the 'Vision Steering Group' which gave a unique opportunity to shape the future of our borough. Currently a member of our clergy is on the 'Resident Quality Group'.





St Pauls is an important member of our Churches Together in Wokingham network and it has been great to see relationships between our two Anglican churches in the town flourish over the last few years. We hope and pray that this will continue as we work together to serve the people of Wokingham.



Buildings



St Paul's Church was consecrated in 1864. It has a capacity of around 300 seated on pews. It has good acoustics. There are a number of ongoing projects to maintain and improve the facilities as outlined in the full description.

About St Paul's

St Paul's Parish Rooms, adjacent to the Churchyard, shares its car park with the church. In addition to the Parish office, 3 meeting rooms and a good kitchen are available for hire and for use by the church.

About Parish Rooms





Woosehill Church Building is notionally a Methodist building but is subject to a formal Sharing Agreement. As well as the main hall there is a kitchen, and a meeting room downstairs. Upstairs there are a further 3 meeting rooms.

About Woosehill

Emmbrook Village Hall is hired by St Nicholas' Church on a regular weekly basis for Sunday services. It has a main hall, a smaller meeting room, and a kitchen.

About Emmbrook





The Rectory is a large modern detached four-bedroomed house built in 2001.

About Rectory

In addition, a Diocese-owned house in Woosehill is currently rented by the Methodist Church for the Woosehill minister. The Curate's house occupied by Rev'd Cara Smart and her family is owned by the Parish.



Living in Wokingham



Lying in the east of the Royal County of Berkshire and at the heart of the Thames Valley, Wokingham is only 30 miles from London. It offers a pleasant blend of countryside and town, historic features and up to date facilities, business and market town trading. The economic prosperity of the district, together with a pleasant environment and excellent transport links, make it an attractive place to live and work.

The town has excellent shopping and leisure facilities, and its many pubs, cafés and restaurants are always very busy. House prices tend to be much higher than the national average. Many of its 50K town population work in London (population of the borough is closer to 180K) . The unemployment rate of 2.4% is well below the national average, and the average wage, £35K is above the national average.

Finances

St Paul's and St Nicholas'

The overall state of the parish finances is buoyant. At the end of 2023 total funds stood at £525,000 including freehold property and restricted funds.

The day-to-day administration of the parish is met by the general (or unrestricted) fund which in 2023 recorded income of £170,000.

St Paul's and St Nicholas' have subscribed to the national Parish Giving Scheme and to date some 80% of regular givers now use this method of donation.

An appeal in the spring resulted in some generous donations and increased giving. However the expected surplus may be impacted by the need to remove a large cedar tree.

In 2023 over £10,000 was donated for international disaster relief as well as support for our key mission partners.

Financial Details for St Paul's

Woosehill

The finances are in a good state. At the end of 2023 the total funds stood at £107,747. Unrestricted funds received an income of £67,645 during the year. The budget for this year is predicting a loss of £7,000, due to the installation of the new boiler earlier this year offset by additional income from JAG holiday club.

£3,500 was paid to supported charities.
