The population of the parish has remained exactly the same since the 2011 Colburn's population has grown by 613, from 4,860 to 5,473 Scotton's population has grown from 524 in 2011 to 696 in 2021 however Hipswell's population has receded from 5,338 in 2011 to

just 4,553 this being a 25% reduction. The 2021 population totalling 10, 722- exactly the same as 2011.
At the 2011 census Colburn was inside the top
100 deprived wards in England & Wales, this is no longer the case as the area has grown and with it has become more affluent seeing average
house prices and sales increase well above the regional average. That said Colburn still has
pockets of deprivation and associated socio- economic challenges.

	Out of a population of 10,722 in the Hipswell/Colburn parish, 2,734 are aged 0-15, 802 are 65 years plus, and there's a working age population of 7,271.
	The population of Scotton is 696, with more than the national average aged over 50 years. 96.4% of these were born in the UK.

On the military side there are a number of Gurkhas and Fijians. We also have a growing number of refugees from various countries living in the area.

House prices in the area are generally higher than the national average for Bands A, B, C, D and E. House prices range from £375,500 for a detached to £149,000 for a terrace house.

Similar to the national figures, 13% of the area are receiving universal credit, of which 5.5% are unemployed. Those in receipt of income support 0.2% and housing benefit 7.7%.

All aspects of crime are below the national average, however the incidents of anti-social behaviour are higher.

Health and well-being of people in the area is generally good and above the national average for all major illnesses, except obesity, which is much higher.

The level of higher education of people in the parish is well below the national average. There are not many facilities locally for higher education. Similarly, other services (such as hospitals) are a fair distance away. On the good side, though, our air quality is much better than the national average.

Since the vacancy, we have started an All-age service at 4pm but this hasn't been going long enough to establish if this will add to our regular numbers.

The finances of the parish are of cause for concern. Whilst the parish share has been paid in full over the past decade or so , it will not be possible for this to be the case in 2024.

The revenue position is one that has shown a steady decline in income over costs since the Covid pandemic. It will be a critical element of the role of the incumbent to drive new revenue streams and / or improve current income streams.

The quinquennial report that was carried out in April 2022 has highlighted a significant spend and as we approach the midway point of this report , to date none of the recommended works have been completed.
